The wrath of God. The love of God.

It's Tuesday after the horrific early Sunday morning mass shooting (the worst in US history) in Orlando. I wrote to the congregation yesterday, Let us pray for the dead and wounded in the terrible mass shooting in Orlando. Let us pray also for their families, relatives and friends. Let us continue to pray, as we have been, for an end to terrorism and also for an end to hatred and bigotry. Finally, let us pray for the wisdom, grace and courage to overcome evil with good. I hope we are continuing to pray for wisdom, grace and courage to overcome evil with good. It's what God would have us do. It's St. Paul's God inspired idea in his letter to the Romans: Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good.

This admonition is the last verse of Romans chapter 12. What precedes it in chapter 12 contextualizes and gives us a deeper understanding: 4 For as in one body we have many members, and not all the members have the same function, 5 so we, who are many, are one body in Christ, and individually we are members one of another. 6 We have gifts that differ according to the grace given to us... 15 Rejoice with those who rejoice, weep with those who weep. 16 Live in harmony with one another; do not be haughty, but associate with the lowly; do not claim to be wiser than you are. 17 Do not repay anyone evil for evil, but take thought for what is noble in the sight of all. 18 If it is possible, so far as it depends on you, live peaceably with all. 19 Beloved, never avenge yourselves, but leave room for the wrath of God; for it is written, "Vengeance is mine, I will repay, says the Lord." 20 No, "if your enemies are hungry, feed them; if they are thirsty, give them something to drink..." 21 Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good.

Yet even these beautiful words are problematic. I'm thinking particularly of verse 19 about the wrath of God. How does the wrath of God fit into an understanding of God as love (I John 4:8)? Maybe we can get some idea what wrath means when we think about the outrage many of us feel in response to the senseless and brutal terrorist attack in Orlando. The attack was utterly unjust and God is passionate about justice, God is passionate about what is right and fair. And many are understandably grief stricken and very angry. Yet the above scripture asks us to leave vengeance to God – an ancient way of saying leave ultimate justice to God. So we ourselves are called to avoid vengeance! (Of course we have a criminal justice system which is called to protect society from dangerous criminals – though this criminal justice system itself is in serious need of reform to make it more just as Brother Scott pointed out in the meditation I asked to be read at church last Sunday). The criminal justice system is supposed to provide safety and order, and prevent vigilante justice (vengeance) by meting out considered justice in our name. Most of us agree with the ideal of a criminal justice system organized by the state. Our lax gun laws however, make it too easy for criminals to get weapons including terribly destructive automatic weapons. And they also can encourage for some, vigilante justice by armed civilians.

But even if most of us agree with leaving criminal justice to the state, that doesn't resolve the grief and rage experienced if one has been a surviving victim or the loved one of a victim of criminal or terrorist violence. Victims and their loved ones have to deal with a range of things from posttraumatic stress to unresolved anger. Therapy and other kinds of treatment can help. God works

through these things as well as through prayer and the healing love of others.

Most of us are spared the direct effects of terrorism or criminal violence, though we're all more or less affected by it. Most all of us however have to deal with being hurt and hurting others and have to deal with the temptations to seek revenge against those who hurt us. So the scriptures above are relevant and valid for all of us. And Romans 12 says, we're called to weep with those who weep (as well as rejoice with those who rejoice). There is of course a great deal of both weeping and rejoicing in this world. We are called to solidarity with those who weep (and with those who rejoice).

What we are not called to do in Romans 12 is, repay evil for evil, we are never to avenge ourselves and we are not to be overcome by evil. This is all easier said than done. How do we resist seeking revenge against those who hurt us, how do we resist harming ourselves with resentment even if we don't directly seek revenge, and how do we overcome evil with good? A clue is in verse six of Romans (and in other places in Scripture) where it

says, We have gifts that differ according to the grace given to us. We learn that our gifts and our talents as well as the grace to use them well, all come from God. This tells us that the grace to resist revenge, the grace to heal our anger, resentment and grief, and the grace to overcome evil with good all also come from God. This healing grace can come directly from God and can come through other people. And that makes sense, for as it also says in Romans above, we are members one of another.

May it be a relief, an encouragement and a great source of hope that God is the one who will help us with our temptations to revenge, and God is the one who will heal us of our anger, resentment and grief and God is the one who will help us overcome evil with good. And the fact that we are members of one another can help us to be who we are – deeply interdependent people. This knowledge can motivate us to forgive rather than seek revenge, for we are called to be in supportive relationship with each other whenever we can.
