A Bit About Maundy Thursday

Maundy Thursday commemorates the Washing of the Feet (Maundy) and Last Supper of Jesus Christ with the Apostles. It is so named in the Book Of Common Prayer and also used by other denominations, two being the Lutheran Church and the Presbyterian Church, but not all. The Roman Catholic Church uses the name "Holy Thursday", for example. But throughout the Anglican Communion, "Holy Thursday" refers to the day of the Ascension, and "Maundy Thursday" is the day before Good Friday.

CAPITAL CAMPAIGN **Update**

As mentioned in the Feb. 2021 issue of A Voice in the Wilderness

Two Capital Campaign projects are slated to begin this Spring season, one inside the church building and the other in front of the building.

John D. Alvarez II, of the firm Landmark Consulting, was the architect for both projects.


Inside the church, we will see the beginning of the major initiative to overhaul the Sacristy, from wall-to-wall and floor-to-ceiling.

This is an important behind-the-scenes area in great need of renovations, which serves the Altar Guild, Acolytes, Lay Eucharistic Ministers (LEMs), Ushers, and, of course, Father John and guest celebrants.

Outside the church is the construction of a new exterior walkway to the front of the church to provide a more accessible entrance.

The locations of both projects are shown in the following Work Area Plan, prepared by Mr. Alvarez. To quote from Mr. Alvarez's project summary: *"The proposed Sacristy project includes removals of selected finishes and modern millwork, installation of new lighting, selective electrical upgrades, counter surfaces, millwork, plumbing & associated fixtures, heating, accessories and floor reinforcing with upgraded floor finishes."* To the right is a cropped drawing of the Sacristy project.


To quote from Mr. Alvarez's summary of the church entry accessibility improvements project: "The proposed accessibility upgrades include the construction of a new inclined walkway, landscaping, exterior landing and stairs to grade. In addition to accessibility upgrades along the south excavation, repairs, water proofing and drainage shall be performed per engineer's site design documents." Continued on Page 4

project. These two projects are made possible, in part, by a generous \$3,500 grant from the Sacred Sites program of The New York Landmarks Conservancy, as announced in the May 2020 issue of this newsletter. Specifically, this grant was made to help St. John's cover the architectural and engineering fees for the first phase of the Capital Campaign's implementation. This was a 1:1 matching grant, so St. John's had to provide an equivalent amount of funds from other sources, which, of course, we were able to do thanks to private gifts received in the Capital Campaign.
