## Save the Date for the ECW Retreat

The Rev. Barbara Crafton will be coming to the Church of St. John in the Wilderness on Saturday, May 2, to lead a Quiet Day, an event sponsored by the E.C.W. for the women of the church.

Barbara is an Episcopal priest and author. She heads The Geranium Farm, an institute for the promotion of spiritual growth. The Farm publishes her Almost Daily eMOS, a meditation read online by tens of thousands worldwide. She has served a number of churches, including historic Trinity Church, Wall Street; St. James, the American church in Florence, Italy; St. John's-in-the-Village in Greenwich Village; and St. Clement's in Manhattan's theater district. She was a maritime chaplain on the New York waterfront, and served as a chaplain at Ground Zero after the attack on the World Trade Center.

A spiritual director and author of many books, Crafton leads retreats and teaches throughout the United States and abroad. She makes her home with her husband, Richard Quaintance, an English professor, in Metuchen, New Jersey, where she currently serves as interim at St. Luke's Episcopal Church.

## Beyond Copake Falls

After some months of neglect, it's time to up periscope for a look around the Anglican world beyond our parish. Here are some highlights from a busy news season.

### *Inclusion in the Church of England*

++Justin Welby inherited several looming problems in March 2013 when he succeeded ++Rowan Williams to become the 105<sup>th</sup> Archbishop of Canterbury. One was solved in July, 2014, when all three of the Church of England's Houses (Bishops, Clergy, and Laity) approved the ordination of women as bishops by the required two thirds majority. Archbishop Welby, a strong advocate for female bishops, was delighted.

On December 17, the Church of England announced the appointment of its first female bishop. The Revd. Libby Lane, whose husband, George, is



also a priest (picture above), is now the vicar of two small parishes in Crewe. She will be consecrated on

26 January and will serve as bishop suffragan in the Diocese of Chester, of which Stockport is a part.

The ordination of Revd. Lane is an important step toward full acceptance of female bishops by the Church of England. The next step – ordination of a female diocesan (entitled to her own cathedral and qualified to sit in the House of Lords) – may be taken by the Diocese of Southwell and Nottingham this year, for two women are on its short list.

In anticipation that female bishops will soon be numerous (Abp. Welby hopes for equal numbers of male and female bishops within 15 years), the House of Commons has proposed legislation to expedite their consideration for appointment to the House of Lords. Under present rules, candidates for the 26 Lords Spiritual seats in that house must wait for a vacancy to appear because of resignation or death. With 40 candidates in line now, female bishops would have a very long wait absent what the *Telegraph* newspaper calls “a limited form of positive discrimination.” Commons proposes, and both Archbishops support, a 10-year waiver of the rules to give women a fair chance.

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Another issue of inclusion – marriage equality – will be a much harder nut to crack. Same sex marriage has been legal in the United Kingdom since July, 2013, when the Queen gave her Royal Assent to positive votes by the Houses of Commons and Lords. The first same sex marriages in the UK took place eight months later, but the Church of England's policy – one man, one woman – remains in effect today. Worse, “‘shared conversations’ on scripture, sexuality, and mission,” intended to help the Synod reach a positive conclusion, have struck a reef. Reform, a leading conservative-evangelical organization, has withdrawn from the conversations and has urged its members not to participate.

While the established Church struggles to decide whether to sanctify same sex marriages, the government of the United Kingdom is creating protocols to convert same sex civil unions into marriages. Meanwhile, the Scottish Episcopal Church has warned gay clergy and lay leaders that they will risk punishment if they try to elevate civil unions to marriages. Progressives north of the border are, to say the least, furious. Indeed, some priests have threatened to stop conducting *any* marriage services as long as the SEC’s ban remains in effect.

The equality cauldron continues to bubble in the UK. For an excellent overview of the theological, historical, and legal case for marriage equality, I very

strongly recommend Bishop Alan Wilson’s 2014 book, *A More Perfect Union?* Wilson, the progressive Bishop of Buckinghamshire, is very well informed and writes beautiful prose with frequent flashes of wise humor. He and his new book are first rate!

### ***Scotus to Weigh in...Maybe***

On January 16, the U.S. Supreme Court announced its intention to hear four cases that will test states’ right to declare same sex marriage illegal and to refuse to recognize same sex couples who were married elsewhere. A 90-minute session for arguments is scheduled for April. A decision is expected by June.

Same sex marriage is now legal in 36 states and the District of Columbia, making it available for 70% of American citizens. It would be astonishing – and devastating -- if the Supremes (specifically Justice Anthony Kennedy, the swing vote) backed away from the Court’s recent progress toward full acceptance of gay constitutional rights. A positive outcome is very likely.

As Susan Russell wrote in the *Huffington Post*, “The truth is that today the Supreme Court took a big step toward taking a giant step.” Indeed it did!
